

# End of an era: Dorothy and Sandy Gaw

On August 29, Dorothy Gaw (née Tannahill) passed away peacefully in the Huntingdon Hospital. To myself, and many more people in the Huntingdon area this marked the end of an era - the team of Sandy and Dorothy Gaw.

Dorothy had been a Health Nurse in the region for some time and she was well known and respected in that field, Sandy Gaw had worked with Dr. Wilfred Watson for two summers and I believe that Dr. Watson persuaded Sandy to set up practice in Huntingdon after having graduated from Guelph University as a veterinarian.

It was in 1939 when Sandy and his mother came to Huntingdon and rented the Nelson Walsh house. Bill Walsh had a room there and he got his meals from Sandy's mother. Sandy's father had passed away before they came to town. He had also been a veterinarian and had been a meat inspector in Perdue, Saskatchewan.

However, it wasn't long until they bought their house on Henderson Street and a couple of years later Sandy met Dorothy and they got married a few years later.

With Dorothy at his side, they formed a very efficient team. Dorothy would take the calls and I can still hear her say: "Sandy" or "the Doctor" is out on a call right now, but he'll call you as soon as he comes in or, in the case of an emergency, he'll be up as soon as he can."

And when his car pulled into the yard, we would say with a great feeling of relief in our voice: "Here's Sandy!"

Dorothy and Sandy both loved animals,

regardless of size or breed. Sandy was also well thought of as a citizen in Huntingdon. He held a seat as alderman for a number of years and as far as I know he always elected back in by acclamation. Dorothy and Sandy raised a happy family - five girls and a boy. I remember stopping at the house for some supplies near Christmas one year and the kids were running around the house with their pet dog. There was a bowl of goodies on the kitchen table. Each kid grabbed a handful as they ran by and the dog took a mouthful too - just one of the gang.

Sandy belonged to the Masonic Lodge, but he found it difficult to attend regularly on account of his practice and his animals always came first.

Dorothy and Sandy Gaw were great humanitarians, greatly respected and are already sadly missed.
