

Arlene Cady Cottingham celebrates birthday number 100

On Sunday, Mrs. Arlene Cady Cottingham crossed a threshold many will never see as she celebrated her 100th birthday, and in spite of the weight of the years which have slowly but surely crept up on her, the Valley's newest centenarian still lives on the bright side of life.

But when asked whether she ever thought she would see her hundredth birthday, she endearingly responds that she never expected to reach this age. " am surprised to still be a part of this world. I realize it even more today, and I am very happy," she says.

Mrs. Cottingham was born in the Township of Sweetburg, known today as Cowansville, in the Eastern Townships on October 14, 1907. She first moved to Ormstown 70 years ago, where she lived on a dairy farm on the Tullochgorum Road. As a young woman of 29-years-old she married George Cottingham in 1936 ten beautiful years until her husband passed away in 1947. The couple had in their short time together four children, two boys and two girls, and of them Bruce, Jean and Mary are still alive today. She lost her second son, Charles, when he was eight days old. Mrs. Cottingham has two grandchildren and a young great

grandchild. While speaking about her children Mrs. Cottingham was visibly proud to say that some of them had been born in the very building that she now calls home. "At one time, the Barrie Memorial Hospital was in this building, and three of my children were born here," she says, with a sin-

She has been living in the Residence Ormstown for the past thirteen years, and the centenarian hardly has any time to be bored. She sits in her rocking chair and watches television, and to pass the time

and their marriage went on to last over she devotes her time to knitting and to

scrapbooking.

At 100 years old, Mrs. Cottingham is in good health and fine spirit, despite a small hearing impairment and the fact that she relies on a cane to help her move about. She is very concerned about physical fitness and she continues to exercise regularly and even takes the stairs when travelling from one floor to another. "She is a woman in fine form for her age. She will live to be 125," says her daughter-inlaw Jeanne.

To help celebrate her 100th birthday, members of her family flew in from as far away as British Columbia to come visit her at the Residence Ormstown, where a special meal was prepared Friday. After the main course was finished, a beautiful birthday cake was brought out and shared with the other residents and the staff at the Residence.

When asked what her secret to such a long life, she answered with only a slightest hesitation that it is essential to live life for each day without worrying too much about what lies ahead.
